PHILADELPHIA, Pa, (November 1, 2009) – Known as *America’s Home for Heroes*, the National Liberty Museum reminds all those who have served our country or currently serve in America’s Armed Forces or law enforcement professions, that you receive free admission to the museum every day.

Additionally, during the Veteran’s Week (**Nov. 8th-Nov. 15th**) Celebration, the museum is proud to extend a **10% discount** on all purchases in the gift shop for all veterans and law enforcement officials to honor those who have served.

The Museum pays respect to more than 2,000 men and women whose heroism helped preserve liberty in the 20th and 21st centuries. **Exhibits include numerous U.S. veterans**, including:

- A personal message from former **Secretary of State, Colin Powell** – a Vietnam and Gulf War Veteran.
- **U.S. Senator Max Cleland**, a triple amputee from injuries sustained in the Vietnam War.
- **Former Senator Bob Dole**, a World War II veteran who went on to become one of the U.S. Republic party’s most celebrated leaders.
- **Theodore Roosevelt**, America’s 26th president and member of the famed “Rough Riders” during the Spanish-American War.
- Korean War veteran **Neil Armstrong**, who went from flying U.S Navy combat missions to NASA’s first lunar landing.
- Highly decorated World War II veteran **Daniel Inouye**, the United States’ first congressman from the new state of Hawaii (1959) and the first American of Japanese descent to serve in Congress.

Experience the exhibit, **“Those Who Answered the Call,” honors both military and civilian heroes who perished in the September 11th, 2001 attacks** on the Pentagon and World Trade Center.

The Museum’s **“Heroes of Liberty From Around the World” gallery pays tribute to the men and women whose sacrifice won World War II**: from Winston Churchill to the anonymous families who sheltered Jewish refugees throughout Europe. The gallery is also featuring two new exhibits **“Extraordinary, Ordinary People,”** and **“Peace Seekers”** sharing stories of heroic people who contributed to the cause of peace in heroic ways.
